

Albania

Overview

Albania has a population of 3.1 million inhabitants, with over 50% under the age of 24 yearsⁱ. Over the past decades, the total fertility rate has dropped from over 6 children per women down to 1.6ⁱⁱ. Simultaneously, major internal and international population movements have taken place, creating challenges for the government's economic and social policy.

Albania has made significant progress towards achieving the goals set out in its National Strategy for Development and Integration 2007-2013, to become a "country with high living standards, which is integrated in the European and Euro-Atlantic structures, is democratic, and guarantees fundamental human rights and liberties".

The country has achieved sustained GDP growth averaging about 6% per annum, contributing to a rapid decline of absolute and extreme poverty. The maternal mortality rate has decreased by one quarter from 2001, to a rate of 5.9 per 100,000 live births in 2010ⁱⁱⁱ.

UNFPA Country Programme Focus and Priorities

Albania is one of the pilot countries of One UN programme. The goal of the Programme of Cooperation in 2012-2016 is to promote sustainable and equitable development, social inclusion and adherence to international norms and obligations. The UNFPA in Albania is committed to addressing reproductive health and rights, population dynamics, gender issues, young people, and supporting vulnerable groups across the country. Special focus is given to improving the quality of health care in the area of Maternal and Child Health, improving the efficiency of National Family Planning Program, as well as strengthening and expanding awareness and community participation in health related programmes.

Partnerships

In addition to working with the government of Albania including the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Labour, Social Affairs and Equal Opportunities, Ministry of Tourism, Culture, Youth and Sports, the Ministry of Education, and the Institute of Statistics UNFPA also partners with civil society, to engage the community and raise awareness on and advocate for human rights, including women's rights. This civil society engagement also covers: addressing poverty and economic development in rural areas, provision of social and health services (including family planning), gender equality, combatting gender-based violence, and HIV/STIs, as well as to assist monitoring of human rights issues and access to justice while reporting to treaty bodies.

The UNFPA assists the government to collect and use data for better policy making and programming, as well as non-state users of data to enhance their capacity to demand, collect and analyze data for improved monitoring of government performance. Working with other UN agencies, the UNFPA helps to foster necessary dialogue among both public and private institutions, focusing on established institutions or task forces, such as those promoting Roma inclusion, and empowering women and young people.
